Readings Next Week (APRIL 23, 2023) 3RD SUNDAY OF EASTER (A)

Acts 2:14,22-33 (Peter and the apostles announce that Jesus has been raised from the dead.)

1 Peter 1:17-21 (You were saved by Christ's sacrifice.)

Luke 24:13-35 (Jesus appears to two disciples who are walking to Emmaus.)

Background on the Gospel Reading

On most Sundays during the Easter season in Cycle A, our Gospel is taken from the Gospel of John. This week's Gospel, however, is taken from the Gospel of Luke. As in last week's Gospel, today's Gospel shows us how the first community of disciples came to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead. In these stories we gain insight into how the community of the Church came to be formed.

When we read today's Gospel, we may be surprised to learn that these friends of Jesus could walk and converse with him at some length yet not recognize him. Again we discover that the risen Jesus is not always easily recognized. Cleopas and the other disciple walk with a person whom they believe to be a stranger; only later do they discover that the stranger is Jesus. We learn that the first community met and recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread, just as we meet Jesus in the Eucharist.

We can imagine the feelings of the two disciples in today's reading. They are leaving their community in Jerusalem. Their friend Jesus has been crucified. Their hope is gone. They are trying to make sense of what has occurred, so that they can put the experience behind them.

Jesus himself approaches the two men, but they take him for a stranger. Jesus asks them what they are discussing. He invites them to share their experience and interpretation of the events surrounding his crucifixion and death. When the two disciples have done so, Jesus offers his own interpretation of his crucifixion and resurrection, citing Jewish Scripture. In that encounter we find the model for our Liturgy of the Word—what we do each time we gather as a community for the Eucharist. We reflect upon our life experiences and interpret them in light of Scripture. We gather together to break open the Word of God.

In the next part of the story, we find a model for our Liturgy of the Eucharist. The disciples invite the stranger (Jesus) to stay with them. During the meal in which they share in the breaking of the bread, the disciples' eyes are opened; they recognize the stranger as Jesus. In the Eucharist too we share in the breaking of the bread and discover Jesus in our midst. Just as the disciples returned to Jerusalem to recount their experience to the other disciples, we too are sent from our Eucharistic gathering. Our experience of Jesus in the Eucharist compels us to share the story with others. (Loyola Press)

MARRIAGE IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH, FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS! 14. What are the best ways to strengthen a marriage?

Couples should first rejoice in God's gift to them of each other. They need to recognize the gift of romance, and to strive to keep that romance alive. Although "falling in love" is driven primarily by (God-given) feelings of attraction, these feelings inevitably vary in intensity and duration. The commitment of marriage requires a decision to keep building a relationship on a deep respect for one

another, on friendship as well as passion, on shared values, hopes and interests, on the desire to make a life and a family together and on a strong sense that through living out this vocation the spouses are responding to God's call to holiness. "Falling out of love" occurs when couples forget that they can rise above their passing feelings and put each other first, caring for the other, despite inevi-

table disappointments in the relationship. The decision to love can help to recreate the feelings of love.

So couples should strengthen their relationship: by spending time together, by listening to each other, by valuing their similarities and differences, by learning to name and discuss their disagreements, by sharing their responsibilities for home and children, by deepening their spiritual life, and by seeking professional marriage -friendly counseling should this be necessary. As their relationship matures, spouses come to value and to love the person they have actually married, rather than the "ideal partner" they imagined on their wedding day.

All this is increasingly difficult to achieve in today's society, so it is more than ever important to actively seek outside support. A couple's choice of friends is important in this regard, as well as their availing themselves of organizations and movements that support and strengthen couples and families. Most important of all are prayer and the sacraments. God wants their relationship to be fulfilling, joyful and fruitful and will never abandon them if they trust in Him.
